"Next to the Word of God, Music Deserves the Highest Praise" -Martin Luther <u>Borodin - String Quartet No. 2: Nocturne (Dover Quartet)</u> Alexander Borodin was a 19th-century Russian doctor and chemist, who found time to be a composer on the side, writing symphonies and the opera *Prince Igor*. This movement is probably his best-known work for chamber ensemble. A "nocturne" is traditionally a lovely, quiet, lyrical piece, meant to evoke the reflective pensiveness of the end of the day.

<u>I was glad - Henry Purcell | Ensemble Pro Victoria</u> Purcell was a 17th-century English composer, really the only quasi-important one between the Renaissance and Elgar (they were busy doing other things for those centuries). It was written for a British coronation in 1685, and the same text, set by different composers, has been used for every similar event for the last 400 years. The one they used last year for Charles was the C.H.H. Parry one, a bombastic Edwardian number, but I like Purcell's clean, low-key approach.
